1946 - Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act," and Section 2 of the Act defines its purposes: "It is hereby declared to be the policy of Congress, as a measure of national security, to safeguard the health and well-being of the Nation's children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities and other food, by assisting the States, through grants-in aid and other means, in providing an adequate supply of food and other facilities for the establishment, maintenance, operation and expansion of nonprofit school lunch programs."

At Risk Meals

- Healthy Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010 expanded eligibility for At-Risk Afterschool Meals to ALL States
- Reimbursement at the free rate for serving one meal and one snack to all children ages 18 and under
- Meals can be served anytime after the school day, on weekends and vacations during the regular school year
- Meals are offered to support afterschool educational or enrichment activities
- Open to schools, nonprofits, and for-profit centers

- At-Risk Breakfast 1.71
- At-Risk Meals 3.16 (lunch or supper)
- Cash in lieu .23

AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAM PARTICIPATION: 2004-2014







- Reached 98,000 children.




