

State Offers School Meals at No Costs for Lower-Income Families

Minneapolis, MN (Aug. 27, 2020) — Minnesota students will continue to have access to nutritious school meals, regardless of the learning model their school will be using for the 2020-21 school year. For families on a limited income, students may be able to receive **two meals a day at no cost.**

All families should complete **an application for Educational Benefits** to see if their child or children qualify for free or reduced-priced school meals. Even those who have received these benefits in the past will need to reapply for the new school year.

In Minnesota, thanks to state legislation, all reduced-priced meals are also free!

"Families across Minnesota are experiencing new or worsened financial hardships due to the COVID-19 pandemic. By applying for Educational Benefits from your school, your child will not only receive access to high-quality meals for free, but may also benefit from reduced school fees," said Education Commissioner Mary Cathryn Ricker.
